Refugees into Teaching is a national project funded by the Training and Development Agency for Schools (TDA). This year's annual conference focuses on the value of developing a diverse school workforce and recruiting refugee teachers. The conference is supported by both the TDA and the Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF).

Drawing on examples of local and regional partnership working, the event intends to bring together education employers, local authorities, teacher training providers and non governmental organisations (NGOs). It will provide practical guidance on supporting refugee teachers into work and professional training.

The conference will include

- o key note speakers from the TDA and Refugee Council
- the launch of the Refugee Teachers Network (based in Leeds, serving regions outside of London)
- o linking diversity with community cohesion and inclusive learning
- examples of good practice of partnership working between local authorities, teacher training providers and NGOs.

Workshop Options

1. Recognition of qualifications and surrounding issues Kate Bellamy

Research and Development team, UK NARIC

The workshop will focus on issues surrounding recognition of overseas qualifications in the UK as well as NARIC's experience, responsibility and research in this field.
